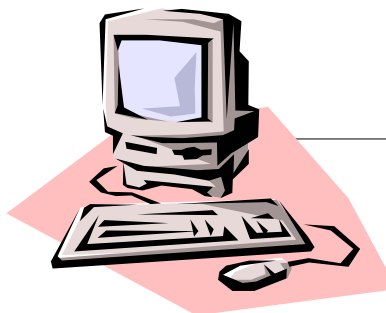

- We're delighted to see so many students using the law library! Please do not hesitate to ask for assistance when you need it. Those first-year research assignments can be tricky until you get the hang of it.
- As a reminder, please return materials to the shelves where you found them. While library staff does re-shelve books on a regular basis, volumes on the wrong shelf or "stashed away" in a "safe place" cause delays and much frustration for your fellow students. Purposely hiding library materials is downright unethical. So please, return the books when you are finished with your assignment.
- We notice that some students are having difficulty with the front door... Upon exiting the law library, on the cloth panel on your right is a small device mounted on the wall. This sensor triggers the automatic door opener. Waive your hand in front of it as you exit, and the door will open for you. We will be happy to demonstrate this if needs be.

ADDITIONAL DATABASES AVAILABLE TO LAW STUDENTS BY REMOTE ACCESS

The University Library recently acquired a contract which will allow law students to have remote access to some of the databases available on their web site. Previously this access was available to the law students while on campus only. To logon to the databases from home, you will need to use your student ID (the barcode number on your ID card) in conjunction with your last name. Among these databases is information on a wide range of subjects including business, economics, technology, politics, health care, company information and statistical reports. Law students will also have access to many journals with full text articles. These da-

tabases should go a long way toward enhancing your legal research.

LAB UPDATES

There have been some big changes in the Computer Labs and Law Library Technology. Most prominent is the inclusion of **double-sided printing** in the P-90 Lab.

Both printers now allow you to print double-sided (also called “duplexing”). To make use of this (and we strongly suggest you do), use *File -> Print* and click *Properties*, and set “two-sided printing” in the *Finishing* tab.

The wireless internet has been given a unified face-lift throughout the library. All access points now share the same name (SSID): **gguwlan**

However, you need to add the access point manually through your Wireless Client (usually accessible by right-clicking your wireless icon and selecting *Properties*). Mac users will need to add it as an “Other” network. The same 64/40-bit WEP password is used, as before. Study Annex users will already be familiar with this setup. This change will also be made to the rest of the university in the near future. Please take a moment to ensure that you registered your MAC address (a unique code for your laptop’s wireless) with GGU4U. If you need any assistance with wireless in the Law Library, please stop by and see a Lab Assistant.

To make better use of our technical support staff, we are no longer offering full-time tech support at the Study Annex. Please contact a Lab Assistant at the P-90 computer lab with any laptop/technical needs you might have.

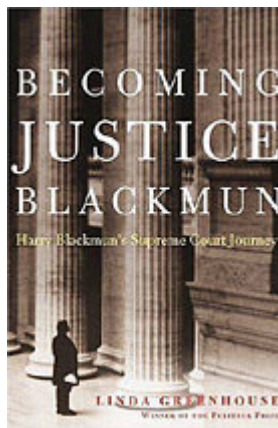
