

Intellectual Property Law Certificate Requirements

(Professor William Gallagher, Certificate Advisor)

The certificate requirements consist of the courses listed below. Where the choice among multiple courses is offered, the list may not be exhaustive; new courses are regularly added to the curriculum. Approval of courses not on the list is within the discretion of the Certificate Advisor. Each approved course must be at least two units.

Students are encouraged to meet with the Certificate Advisor to plan their courses and should note that not all classes are offered every term.

To earn a Certificate in Intellectual Property Law, a student must complete and earn a B- or better* in the following courses:

1. Intellectual Property Law Survey (3), and one course from the following:
 - Copyright Law of the US (3)
 - Patent Law of the US (3)
 - Trademark Law of the US (3)
 - Trade Secret Law (2)

2. And **two** courses from the following list. At least one course must meet either the experiential learning course or the upper division writing requirement.
 - Antitrust (3)
 - Art & the Law (2)
 - Biotechnology Law (3)
 - Competition: IP Law Moot Court (2)
 - Copyright Law of the US (3)
 - Cyber Law (3)
 - Entertainment Law (3)
 - Externship: Civil Field Placement in an IP-related placement (2-4)
 - Independent Study on an IP Law topic (2)
 - Intellectual Property Litigation: Copyright & Trademark (2)
 - IP Practicum: Patent Law (2)
 - Negotiating & Drafting Contracts in the Entertainment Business (2)
 - Patent Law of the US (3)
 - Patent Litigation (2)
 - Privacy Law (3)
 - Privacy Law & Technology (2)
 - Sports Law (2)
 - Trade Secret Law (2)
 - Trademark Law of the US (3)
 - Venture Capital Business Transactions (3)

* *All courses counted toward the certificate must be taken for a letter grade unless a course is only offered on a credit/no credit basis (e.g., Externship courses)*
