Certificate of Specialization in Real Estate Law

This certificate requires concentrated coursework, clinical practice, and an independent study project. Students gain practical training through either the Real Estate Clinic or the Landlord-Tenant Clinic.

In the Real Estate Clinic, students focus on either transactions or litigation in a field placement at a local law firm under an attorney's direct supervision. Students interested in landlord-tenant law can participate in the Landlord-Tenant Clinic and work at a variety of public agencies and private firms.

Golden Gate Law’s Intellectual Property Law Program features over two dozen IP-focused courses. Students gain broad theoretical and practical understanding of this rapidly emerging field and can explore its many subfields, including copyright, entertainment, and sports law; Internet and software law; patent and biotechnology law; and trademark and unfair competition law. Students gain extensive understanding of closely related and often overlapping fields of study, such as international law, particularly with respect to cyberlaw.

Certificate of Specialization in Intellectual Property Law

One of Golden Gate Law’s most popular specialization certificates, the Certificate in IP Law lets students develop highly specialized expertise in one of the many subfields in IP law. Students must complete 14 units of focused coursework, which can include a clinical experience, supervised research project, or participation in one of several moot court competitions.

Golden Gate University School of Law is one of the top public interest law schools in the nation and employs a full-time public interest law advisor. Many courses, programs, and clinics are especially designed to serve students interested in going on to work in the public sector.

Certificate of Specialization in Public Interest Law

This certificate requires 14 units of specialized coursework, 150 hours of supervised legal work in a public interest or government setting, and 25 hours of community service.

Clinical Training in Public Interest Law

Students can gain direct experience in their particular area of interest working with Golden Gate Law’s on-site Environmental Law and Justice Clinic and Women’s Employment Rights Clinic or off-site field-placement clinics, including the Civil Field Placement Clinic, Criminal Litigation Clinic, Environmental Law Clinic, Immigration and Refugee Policy Clinic, Landlord-Tenant Clinic, and Pro Bono Tax Clinic.

Scholarships and LRAP

Each year, entering law students are chosen as Public Interest Scholars, receiving a \$5,000 annual scholarship and funding for one full-time public interest or government internship while in law school. Golden Gate Law is one of the few US law schools to pay the employer’s portion of a work-study award for students working for public interest organizations and government agencies. The School hosts an annual Public Interest Law Foundation (PILF) fundraising auction that in 2007 raised \$30,000 for public interest law students. And the Loan Repayment Assistance Program (LRAP) offers generous grants to graduates employed in low-paying public interest jobs.

Public Interest/Public Sector Legal Careers Day

This annual job fair draws over 100 public interest and government employers to San Francisco.

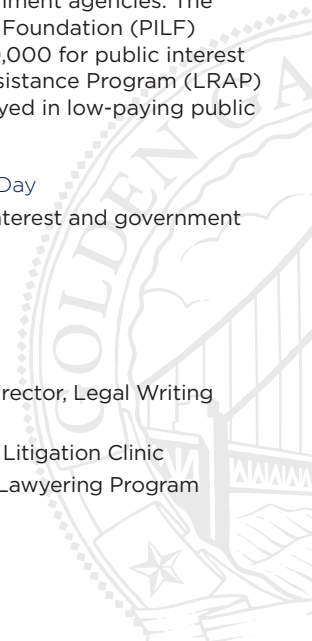

Golden Gate Law's Taxation Program is one of the preeminent tax law programs in the Western United States. Studying under experienced faculty, students gain a solid foundation in the basics of federal, state and local taxation as well as real estate, partnership, corporate, and international tax law and are encouraged to branch out into areas of particular interest, including business taxation, estate planning, or employee benefits.

Certificate of Specialization in Taxation

Students must complete 14 units of core courses and electives. Many go on to earn an advanced degree (LLM) in Taxation; those who do can apply up to 9 units of related tax coursework to the LLM in Taxation Program.

Pro Bono Tax Clinic

Law students have the opportunity to review appeals filed with the Board of Equalization by taxpayers of limited means, primarily from final actions from the Franchise Tax Board. They will be responsible for ascertaining the issues presented on appeal, conducting the necessary research, and preparing briefs for the board's consideration. Students learn tax and administrative law, as well as client counseling techniques, while providing a valuable service on a pro bono basis to under-served members of society. Students work under the direct supervision of a supervising attorney from the Board of Equalization, while attending a classroom training meeting every other week.

Certificate of Specialization in Environmental Law

This certificate requires concentrated coursework, a research paper, and clinical practice working with one of the School of Law's environmental law clinics or as an extern.

Environmental Law Clinics

Golden Gate Law was one of the first law schools in the country to establish an Environmental Law and Justice Clinic. Working under the supervision of clinic professors, students directly represent environmental organizations and community groups in low-income and minority communities on real-life public health, toxics, and environmental justice matters. Golden Gate Law also offers an off-site Environmental Law Clinic, in which students earn academic credit working as interns for government agencies, public interest groups, and national and local environmental organizations.

Scholarships

Each year, entering law students are chosen as Environmental Law Scholars. This distinction includes an annual scholarship of \$5,000.

Competitions

Students may participate in local, state, and national trial competitions focusing on environmental law. In 2006, Golden Gate Law advanced to the quarterfinal round at the National Environmental Law Moot Court Competition and finished second in the California State Bar Law Student Environmental Negotiations Competition—which the law school won in 2005.
